What are the seating arrangements? Are the seats self-selected by the learners? How are the tables and chairs organised?		
Are the classroom rules visible to the learners?

How does your mentor teacher gain the attention of the learners?		
How are materials distributed in the classroom?		
In the course of one day, what different teaching strategies and approaches does your mentor teacher employ to cater to the varying needs of the learners?		

What does the mentor teacher do when a learner misbehaves?	
What are the consequences for on-going poor behaviour?	
Does your teacher use rewards? If so, what and how are they used?	
Observe how your teacher: Sets clear expectations	
Provides clear, concise age appropriate instructions	
Scans the class and waits for everyone to be listening	
Comments on positive behaviour	
Ignores or gives little attention to those doing the wrong thing	
Redirects inappropriate behaviour	
Speaks respectfully to learners providing choices for those who exhibit inappropriate behaviour	
Follows through when behaviour is inappropriate	
How is your mentor teacher firm, fair and consistent in managing the class?	
Make note of anything else you notice about your mentor teacher's approach to managing the classroom.
